Warner Bros. The 1960s was an era of cultural transformation, and the films of the time had significant effects on global culture. Established directors like Hitchcock and Billy Wilder released some of their best work, while newer filmmakers like Stanley Kubrick began building their careers over the decade. In addition, independent cinema began to make major forays into the mainstream. The following list consists of the most important (though not necessarily the best) films released during the 1960s. Movies are listed in chronological order according to the release date. After releasing a hit series of classic films in the 1950s, filmmaker Billy Wilder began the 1960s with another ground-up comedy, *The Apartment*. Jack Lemmon plays C.C. Baxter, a large company employee who allows his bosses to use his apartment to pursue extramarital affairs. Baxter falls in love with an elevator operator (Shirley MacLaine), but learns that she is the target of the affection of one of his bosses. Comedy deals frankly with the theme of infidelity, which had previously been a taboo subject in Hollywood. The apartment won five Oscars, including Best Picture. Wilder, Lemmon and MacLaine later reunited for 1964's *Irma la Douce*. Paramount Pictures Alfred Hitchcock was one of the leading stellar directors during this period. With *Psycho*, Hitchcock reduced his usual big budgets, choosing instead to make a small-scale film in black and white. *Psycho* tells the story of a small-town motel murder and the shocking discoveries resulting from the investigation. *Psycho* and its famous shower scene would inspire the style and tone of the slasher film genre with its mix of violence, disturbing behavior and sexuality. *West Side Story* transposed Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet to contemporary New York City. The film version is considered by critics to be one of the best film adaptations of a hit Broadway musical. He examined the racial dynamics of U.S. cities, representing a white band and a Puerto Rican band facing off in a blood dispute. *West Side Story* was a box office success and won 10 Academy Awards. The songs, especially *Somewhere (There's a Place for Us)* *America* and *Tonight*, are among the most popular in musical theater and American film history. Bond, James Bond. British superspies James Bond, one of the most iconic film heroes, made his first film appearance in 1962 in *Dr. No*. Sean Connery plays Bond, knocking down the evil main character (Joseph Wiseman) while romancing Honey Ryder (Ursula Andress). *El Dr. It* was not a great success that inspired a long-running franchise. Bond's best films would arrive later in the 1960s, such as *From Russia with Love* (1963) and *Goldfinger* (1964). *Dr. No* is the box office hit that started it all. More than 55 years and 24 sequels later, Bond continues to thrive on screen. The 1960s was a fundamental decade for international cinema. Italian cinema, in particular, flourished during the decade. The time The famous Italian director, Federico Fellini, released his masterpiece *8 1/2* as a reflection of a filmmaker who faces a creative block and a midlife crisis, and the emotional consequences he faces as a result. This surreal retrospective film inspired many filmmakers, including Woody Allen and Terry Gilliam, and was adapted as a musical called *Nine* in 2009. *8 1/2* won the Oscar for Best Foreign Language Film. It was Fellini's third Oscar. Columbia Pictures Considered by critics to be the best black comedy ever made, *Dr. Strangelove or: How I Learned to Stop Worrying and Love the Bomb* took advantage of America's real fear of nuclear war. Director Stanley Kubrick began the project as a serious thriller adapted from the novel *Red Alert*, but the film evolved into a comedy during the script writing process. British comedian Peter Sellers plays three roles, including the president of the United States, who faces a crisis when an Air Force general instigates a nuclear attack on the Soviet Union. Sellers also plays the main character, an eccentric scientist. The hilarious farewell to government ineptitude and international politics remains a popular satire. After taking the world by surprise with their music, the Beatles made their first film, *A Hard Day's Night*, in 1964. The Fab Four demonstrated a remarkable talent for comedy in the film, which was hugely successful and influential. *A Hard Day's Night* demonstrated the cultural power of rock and roll, which would only grow for the rest of the decade. It also served as inspiration for future music videos. Few films have been as influential as *The Good, the Bad and the Ugly*, one of the greatest westerns ever made. Italian filmmaker Sergio Leone turned the often ridiculous Spaghetti Western into high art with his Dollars Trilogy, a trio of acclaimed westerns starring American actor Clint Eastwood. In *The Good, the Bad and the Ugly*, Eastwood plays one of three men in search of Confederate gold buried in a growing battle of wit. The film is famous for its impressive cinematography and beloved music by Ennio Morricone. *Bonnie and Clyde*, starring Faye Dunaway and Warren Beatty as the main characters, was one of the first films to glamorize criminals since the 1930s. Warner Brothers was concerned that these creative options would sink the film, but *Bonnie and Clyde* ended up becoming a huge success. The filmmakers followed suit in depicting *The Violence*. *Bonnie and Clyde*. The film is considered a precursor to the New Hollywood era of the 1970s. In *The Heat of the Night* was one of the first Hollywood films to star in a African-American as the hero. Sidney Poitier plays Virgil Tibbs, a Philadelphia detective who is arrested in Mississippi as a murder suspect and ends up working on the case. The film, which examines racial prejudice, felt revealing at the time it was released during the Human Rights Movement in the United States. In 1967, *Poitier* also starred in two other hits: *To Sir, with Love* and *Guerilla*. *No's Coming to Town* and *In the Heat of the Night* won five Academy Awards, including Best Picture. Two sequels starring Poitier followed. *Cool Hand Luke* Brooks made his director's debut with this Prodigy, a comedy film about a bad-tempered prisoner (*Zero Mostel*) in an roundup (*Gene Wilder*). It was followed by four sequels, a television series and a cartoon series. *More Planet of the Apes* followed in the 21st century. Four years after *Dr. Strangelove*, filmmaker Stanley Kubrick returned with the equally ambitious 2001: A Space Odyssey. Segments of the film traced human history from Dawn of Man's origins to the future year 2001. The episodic narrative leaves much of the film open to interpretation. 2001 won the Oscar for best visual effects and is considered a reference film in the field of special effects. *Zombie movies* and TV shows today derive perhaps from the best horror movie ever made: *Night of the Living Dead*. This independently made horror feature film has inspired countless horror movie filmmakers, and its realistically gory image created controversy with audiences. Director George A. Romero stated that he chose Duane Jones, an African-American actor, in the title role simply because he had the best audition. However, critics suggested that casting was a sign that the film was an allegory of racism and the Civil Rights Movement. Regardless of the original intent, *Night of the Living Dead* is now considered a game-changing film. Romero directed five sequels from 1978 to 2009. Countless copycats have followed, including the popular television series *The Walking Dead*. *Easy Rider* demonstrated a new style of realism in cinema. In this low-budget road movie, Dennis Hopper and Peter Fonda play a couple of motorcyclists who traffic drugs traveling through the United. After a very positive reception at the 1969 Cannes Film Festival, *Easy Rider* became a huge hit in the United States. The soundtrack, which featured Steppenwolf, The Band and Jimi Hendrix, was equally popular. *Easy Rider* marked a step towards independent cinema and the New Hollywood era of the 1970s. 1970.
